## WEEKLY ACTIVITY REPORT

10-6-14 through 10-12-14

### HOLLYWOOD BID:

The teams made a total of 12 arrests. Nine were for drinking in public, 2 for blocking the sidewalk and 1 felony. They also made 33 homeless referrals, made 3 agency assists, provided 14 foot beat patrols for a total of 25.9 hours, made 266 citizen contacts, handled 66 radio calls for service, and contacted 351 businesses.

### ARRESTS OF INTEREST:

On 10-6-14, Officers Carrasquillo and Mooney arrested Derek Teach for drinking in public at Hollywood and Highland. After taking him to the LAPD Station, we learned that he was a wanted Parolee at Large.

### EVENTS OF INTEREST:

On 10-6-14, Sgt. Reyes and Officer Sewell found 8 people in the EACA alley with alcohol. They were not drinking at the time and were asked to leave. They complied. These patrols in the alley are conducted multiple times each day.

10-7-14 was a busy day for meetings and I had a pretty good tour of both BIDS on my trusty T-3 as I drove to each. First was the LAPD Crime Control Meeting. After assisting on a couple of calls for service, I headed for the Social Security Office for a Security Issues Meeting. Kerry Morrison and Sarah MacPherson were in attendance. The final and most colorful meeting was at the Salvation Army Senior Citizen Apartments located at 5940 Carlos. Bike Officers Nam and Anderson also attended as they have provided much extra patrol at the location. They have formed personal relationships with John, the Managers and other tenants.

The meeting was to address security concerns of the residents after one resident named John was robbed and badly beaten. It was standing room only and appeared that most of the residents were in attendance. There was well over 130 people there. SLO Armen Sevdalian spoke first. Many in the audience were of Russian and Armenian descent. Armen would speak in Armenian and a man in the audience would translate into Russian. Many of the ladies became upset for unknown reasons and Armen was soon in the position of herding cats.

Armen actually threatened to leave several times due to the unruly brigade of wheelchair and walker bound ladies. When I was called upon to speak, I spoke quickly and briefly about the BID and how to contact us. I beat a hasty retreat as one of the ladies wanted to know why they could not have a water treatment device like another apartment building has.

All in all it was a very positive event and many in attendance stopped by to thank us when it was over. I felt that the thanks were sincere although I had a troubling feeling when I saw a mass movement towards the kitchen where snacks were being served that perhaps this may have been the reason for the huge turnout.

On 10-8-14, Officers Watkins and Sewell found a woman down on the sidewalk at 6547 Hollywood Blvd. They stopped and asked if she needed medical attention, but she was just sleeping. They learned that her name was Melissa and was 29 years old. She gathered up her belongings and went on her way.



On 10-8-14, a tourist from Liverpool UK got a flat tire right outside our office and did not know how to change it. Officer Parra and Ayala rushed to the rescue and changed the tire for the grateful visitor.

On 10-10-14, Bike Officers Nam and Anderson responded to a call of a man down at Hollywood Liquor. The man had a medical condition and Paramedics were called. They responded and took him to the hospital.

### SUNSET BID:

The teams made a total of 6 arrests. Three were for drinking in public, 2 for urinating in public and 1 for trespass. They also made 7 homeless referrals, made 2 agency assists, provided 11 foot beat patrols for a total of 17.2 hours, made 158 citizen contacts, handled 29 radio calls for service and contacted 218 businesses.

### ARRESTS OF INTEREST:

On 10-9-14, we received a call of a man refusing to leave the property at the KTLA Sunset Bronson Studios located at 5800 Sunset Blvd. He was loud and aggressive and was trying to get inside the building. He insisted on seeing the President of the Studio because he claimed to have found a cure for Ebola. He also had the solution to the problem with I.S.I.S.

The man, Justine Palmer, continued acting in an aggressive and erratic manner. Our entire team ended up at the scene. Palmer refused to obey commands and he pulled a stick out and threatened the Officers. At one point he reached for his waistband and Officer Nam, fearing that he was arming himself further, deployed the Taser.

The barbs did not make good contact as one did not completely penetrate Palmers shirt. He only received the partial effect of the device. He stopped resisting and was placed under arrest for trespass. We immediately called Paramedics and the LAPD per our Taser policy.

Paramedics checked Palmer and he refused further treatment and was approved for booking. Joe Salazar and I responded to the scene as did Andrews Vice Presidents Farrar and Adams. Numerous witnesses were interviewed and testified to the suspect's aggressive and strange behavior.

This incident represents our third Taser usage since we began carrying it on 10-18-10. Since that date in 2010 through 10-5-14, we have made 4780 arrests, handled 17,643 calls for service and made 68,307 documented citizen contacts. I believe that these numbers illustrate the great restraint we have used in deploying this device.

### EVENTS OF INTEREST

On 10-06-14, Officers Ayala and Goddard spoke to Henry and Jason who have been living on the street. They said that they had a relative that was going to allow them to stay at his house, but they needed a ride to Western and 80<sup>th</sup> street. Officer Ayala called Reggie from PATH who arranged for the transportation.

On 10-7-14, Officers Coogle and Ayala woke six people that were sleeping at 6300 Homewood. Two had been approved to move into an apartment. Our Officers called PATH and were able to arrange transportation for the two people who were moving off the street.

On 10-12-14, Officers Gonzales and Cox saw a suspicious van stopped in the number 1 lane of Vine and Yucca. There was no one in the vehicle. We called the LAPD who advised that the van had been reported as stolen. Our Officers stood by until the LAPD responded and recovered the van.
